







GOVERNING PLANETARY HEALTH IN AN UNEQUAL WORLD

The Covid-19 pandemic has highlighted the importance of planetary health — a framework that recognises the interdependence of human, animal and environmental health — in a world marred by the climate change and biodiversity crises, as well as growing inequalities between and within countries. With the WHO's calls for vaccine equity ignored, vaccine nationalisms have threatened progress towards the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the 2030 Agenda's mandate of 'leaving no one behind'. This event debates how we should go about governing planetary health when inequalities in human health are yet to be addressed. What value might environmental justice efforts add? What role is there for food systems? How might women help push planetary health to the forefront? And how can researchers help shape planetary health policy?
